Thanks to you, thousands of pets were saved and tens of thousands of people connected with ARF animals for better health and well-being during the 2018 - 2019 fiscal year.

ARF's leadership in disaster mobilization was sought during multiple wildfire disasters. Our team responded with a multi-faceted approach coordinating regional evacuation efforts, clearing adoptable animals out of fire-threatened areas and finding them loving homes. Our inhouse veterinary team treated many cats who were badly burned in the Camp and Carr fires. It was so gratifying to see these cats recover; their whiskers no longer singed and their fur no longer gray from ash.

ARF is also excited to share our expertise with shelters nationwide as we expand our Pets and Vets program, bringing the benefits of psychiatric service dogs to more veterans in need. We hope to hit the goal of our campaign in the final weeks of 2019, with less than \$100,000 left to raise. I'm reminded of the generosity of the ARF family every day as I see the construction progress on the new Pets and Vets center. I'm proud of what we are accomplishing together. This expansion will provide invaluable opportunities in Saving Both Ends of the Leash®. Shelters across the country are already interested in bringing ARF's Pets and Vets program to their communities.

Thanks to you, we are pushing the boundaries of excellence in animal behavior, training, and shelter medicine. We are cultivating the human-animal bond in life-changing ways and setting new standards for creative partnerships to expand services to under-served communities.

## spay and neuter surgeries performed

Spaying and neutering remains one of the most effective tactics at reducing the number of unwanted pets entering shelters. ARF's low-cost spay and neuter clinic opened its doors in 2003 and has been providing high-quality, affordable services for dogs and cats ever since. More than 28% of surgeries were performed on the mobile clinic.

## cats and dogs fostered

Volunteer foster families open their homes to help animals recover from illness or surgery, increase social skills, or de-stress from the trauma of losing their previous home. In this fiscal year, more than 50% of animals rescued were fostered in private homes.

Fostering also helps ARF perform home assessments of potential Pets and Vets service dogs and gives puppies and kittens a safe environment with plenty of real-world socialization experiences.

# exams for EMF clients' & veterans' pets

ARF's Emergency Medical Fund® (EMF) provides affordable, non-emergency veterinary care to families experiencing serious financial crises.

ARF also supports veteran-pet relationships by providing free wellness care and vaccinations for their dogs and cats. Our state-of-the-art mobile clinic travels to regional VA medical centers every week, providing free preventative care on-site for veterans' animals.

## Pets and Vets matches made

ARF matches veterans with carefully selected shelter dogs free of charge. Veterans and their four-legged companions receive free, personalized training for dogs to become psychiatric service animals. Classes are taught under the leadership of experienced service dog trainers who are fellow veterans. Service skills taught may include waking from night terrors, medication reminders, or alerting to panic attacks, anxiety, and more.

## animals rescued from Northern CA wildfires


In response to the 2018 Carr and Camp fires, ARF provided disaster relief to more than half a dozen impacted shelters. Numerous deliveries provided burn cream, bandages, vaccines, and other medical supplies. In addition, ARF rescued 124 shelter animals displaced by the fires. Some of these cats and dogs were treated for burns, smoke inhalation, and dehydration. When physically and behaviorally ready, adoptable animals found loving homes and stray animals were reunited with their families.


## hours volunteered

## 2018 - 2019 Fiscal Year Revenue


# 2018 - 2019 Fiscal Year Expenses
